Thursday 19th , due to some members being un-available on the following day.



Safety First: Safety is always most important when working with tools, especially power tools. One of the principles behind the **induction** process currently taking place at



the shed is to establish what tools our members are qualified to use safely, and to establish training for those who have not had the necessary experience at working with a particular machine. The members come from a variety of backgrounds and are not necessarily qualified to use all the equipment safely. As well as the training in safe working practices, the

machines must be regularly checked to make sure the safety features

are working correctly and they are in good condition.

If any aspect of using a power tool concerns you, immediately discuss it with the shed supervisor. If it might be an electrical problem, DON'T try and fix it yourself—refer it to the shed electrician.

When the induction process is complete, each name badge will have a colour patch on it which



will indicate the members level of competence. This will make sure we all use our given talents—to assist each other in making the shed run smoothly AND Safely.
